'Miracle on the Mound' taps emotions

Hal Young of the Sacramento Solons doesn't remember the last pitch he threw, one that could have been his last moment on Earth.

"He was dead a week ago," Solons catcher Jeff Hetherington said.

Young doesn't recall falling off the mound Nov. 10 in a game at CenturyLink No. 4 against the Baltimore Baseball Club with two outs in the top of the fourth inning of a 10 a.m. game. He doesn't recall teammates rushing to his side or a retired paramedic from another field coming to his aid or hearing bleak news about chances for survival.

Now, about a mile away from where he tumbled off a mound, in Room 5202 at Gulf Coast Medical Center, the 73-yearold pitcher is recovering and alert.

He doesn't recall the ambulance ride or paddles being placed on his chest to jolt a heartbeat back or the worried looks on teammates or calls to his seven children, six of whom were on a cruise. He doesn't recall that a pulse was detected on the mound.

What about the thunderbolt from a defibrillator that a teammate said lifted him completely off the ground?

Or being placed on a gurney and the ambulance ride?

Or a medical procedure called therapeutic hypothermia being used to lower his body temperature in the hospital?

Or that, as teammate Lanny Ropke said, he was turning blue on the green grass and brown dirt of CenturyLink? Or that a teammate recalls the ambulance shaking as EMTs frantically worked to save Hal Young?

"I don't remember anything," Young said Tuesday morning as he sat up in bed.

Now, his sternum is sore from where

teammates and paramedics repeatedly compressed his chest to kick-start his heart.

A shiny white baseball signed by all the Solons sat a few inches away. Teammates Pat Kelly and Joe Soto sat with their backs to a window chatting with their pitcher, a few feet to Young's left. To his right his son Jake stood and videotaped the meeting with a cellphone. His children Lea and Greg were on their way.

The transformation from near death

to sitting up in bed and alert has been dubbed "The Miracle on the Mound" by Diana Ropke, wife of Ropke,

The Miracle required many hands and many prayers. There were the teammates and the players from other teams and the quick EMT response and trip to Gulf Coast Medical Center, which is only 1.4 miles away from CenturyLink. Then came the medical professionals at the nearby hospital, which requires only a

four-minute journey according to Google Maps.

Teammate and opposing players and those from other teams prayed.

"We weren't going to give up on our teammate and friend," Hetherington said. "He wasn't going to give up."

But it looked bleak. Ropke said doctors told them there was nothing they could do. Yet, Young pulled through and now Ropke says each day his friend is getting better.

Young had struck out the first two batters in the top of the fourth with his team leading 8-4. Hertherington had thrown the ball down to third to start the around-the-horn ritual when Young keeled over. He didn't brace himself. Hertherington sprinted to the mound and yelled for somebody to call 9-1-1.

Hetherington could not find a pulse in his friend. A retired paramedic from Chicago named Jeff Purtell was playing on another field and hustled over to help.

Hetherington reached out to Young's family to let them know. Jake Young asked Hetherington to represent the family at the hospital.

"Jeff was able to BS his way into the emergency room," Kelly said.

The game was suspended.

"There was no way on God's green Earth we could continue," Kelly said

What exactly happened to Young?

"They said I had cardiac arrest," Young said.

He said that before coming to Florida he knows there was a blood clot in a lung.

At first, a week ago signs of life were weak. Hetherington said an encouraging sign came when he asked Young if he knew who he was.

"You're my catcher," Young told Hetherington.

By Saturday, Young was sitting up in a chair and leading conversations, according to Hetherington.

Now, sitting in that bed, talking with family and friends, only days away from a duel with death, Young is looking ahead.

"My main goal is to get clearance to start conditioning," Young said.

The short-term memory is still shaky.

From his bed, Young asked, "Did I come into the game?" He was told he started the game and pitched into the fourth inning.

What about returning to the field?

"I would love to see him play ball," Jake, 47, said. But first things first.

Thanksgiving is right around the corner. Christmas is a bit more than a month away. Then there are the 25 grandchildren. Baseball?

"We need him around for other things," Jake said.

Hal Young is around for those other things.

"He went someplace else," Hetherington said. "And he's back."

Back with his friends and teammates and children and grand-children...




Playoff pitching guidelines

Roy Hobbs requirement is that all pitchers who will be starters or closers in save situations (3-run or less difference in the 8th and 9th innings) qualify for the playoffs by pitching at least 2 innings – 6 outs or 10 hitters – during pool play.

AAAA qualifier teams may not add pitchers to their lineup after Pool Play concludes; however, Open Division teams may have pitchers arrive Wednesday – those pitchers must throw 5 innings or 25 hitters to qualify for the playoffs.

Finally, in the playoffs, those "non-qualified" middle-inning pitchers will come to the mound from their normal defensive positions where they started the game. That is as important as the "spirit of the rule" that these *non-qualified* pitchers who are used as "inning-eaters" are players who ordinarily are playing other positions.

And, please remember that any players leaving the RHWS Monday to return on Thursday MUST turn in their player ID Card and re-register upon their return. They must return before the quarterfinals of the playoffs, regardless of division.

Second, be sure to stretch and loosen up before playing, or even re-entering a game.

In case of an emergency, contact the field manager at your site. He has the First Aid supplies and will contact 911 services as needed.

Ice is available for injuries ... check with the field manager on duty or go to the nearest concession stand to have the appropriate personnel paged. Roy Hobbs requests that managers plan for pitchers needing ice for their arms and to supply it.

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Admission, \$1 a game v

Admission continues at the Roy Hobbs World Series.

Admission is \$1 per game or \$5 for a tournament pass. Spectators will pay \$1 for entrance into each complex and are good for one day.

The \$5 tournament pass is available at RH Headquarters or from the Site Concierges at each security table; there is no family pass. The tournament pass is a plastic card that guarantees admission for that person for the duration of the RHWS. A loop comes with the tournament pass card for easy attachment to purses, beltloops, etc.

Playing site security

The active steps taken several years ago to deal with parking lot security will continue as parking lot theft issues have - knock on wood - not been an issue the last 7 years.

Are we out of the woods? No, it is a daily procedure and effort to make sure parking lots are safe.

Once again, Roy Hobbs will have personnel posted at the player/spectators' entrances to Terry Park, PDC, JetBlue Complex and at the entrance to the Quad fields at Lee County.

These individuals will have a view of the parking lot, and they will be available in emergencies, be enforcing cooler guidelines and handling admissions.

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Customer Service

Roy Hobbs Baseball is proud of its record on customer service.

Staff members are required to wear identifying staff shirts during the working hours of the tournament and should be easily identifiable. At least two are assigned to each of the satellite complexes daily.

In the case of **emergency**, please go to the nearest concession stand at the satellite complexes, where someone will be available to summon help.

Roy Hobbs field managers and key personnel are Red Cross First Aid certified, and Roy Hobbs Baseball has guidelines in place on the handling of injuries. Additionally, AED devices are available at each of the facilities, and Roy Hobbs personnel have been trained on those devices.
