Did Roy Hobbs Find A New Illustrated Man?

Chip Chapman of the Tidewater Drillers is The Illustrated Man of the Roy Hobbs World Series.

He's not to be confused with "The Illustrated Man," a 1951 collection of short stories by science fiction legend Ray Bradbury.

Not even close. Chapman's tattoos pay homage to base-ball legends -Jackie Robinson, Hank Aaron, Rickey Henderson and Ken Griffey, Jr. He also has a tattoo of a newspaper clipping from when Robinson broke baseball's color barrier.

His love of baseball is not surprising. He comes from a baseball family. His legal name is Arthur Chapman III. His late grandfather was a Philadelphia Phillies scout. His father is a retired Philadelphia police officer who umpires college baseball.

Chapman, 35, said when he was an infant and in an incubator, his father placed a rubber baseball bat in the incubator. As he grew up, he attended his father's games or went on scouting trips with his grandfather.

His baseball resume includes playing at Bishop McDevitt High School, Burlington County College and the University of West Virginia and serving as an assistant coach at Delaware County College.

This is Chapman's third World Series.

"I just love baseball and playing on beautiful fields, playing with guys I can relate to," Chapman said. "They have that passion for the game and the knowledge of the game."

It's safe to say few if any have so many baseball tattoos.

Chapman said people who notice the tattoos love them.

He has a special reverence for Robinson for the courage he showed breaking baseball's color barrier in 1947.

In addition to the tattoos, Chapman pays tribute to these legends by wearing the number 6. He settled on that numeral by adding the digits in Robinson's 42 and Griffey's 24.

He reveres Aaron, who is No. 2 on baseball's all-time home run leader board.

"If it wasn't for steroids, he'd still have the record," said Chapman, who owns a painting business in Philadelphia, is passing along the family baseball tradition to his 7-year-old son Andrew, who is starting to play.

Teammate Matt Blazynski would like to see Chapman create a big social media presence for the tattoos.

"Why not share the love with the whole baseball world," Blazynski said.

Drillers manager Dan Gavlick knows the tattoos are attention-grabbers.










Playoff pitching guidelines

Roy Hobbs requirement is that all pitchers who will be starters or closers in save situations (3-run or less difference in the 8th and 9th innings) qualify for the playoffs by pitching at least 2 innings – 6 outs or 10 hitters – during pool play, if they are in the dugout starting Sunday. If they check-in after Monday's games, they must pitch 5 innings (15 outs or 25 hitters).

AAAA qualifier teams may not add pitchers to their lineup after Pool Play concludes; however, AAAA teams may bring in 2 position players after Tuesday's games, but they must play the entire first game of the playoffs with no shared lineup options.

Finally, in the playoffs, those "non-qualified" middle-inning pitchers will come to the mound from their normal defensive positions where they started the game. That is as important as the "spirit of the rule" that these *non-qualified* pitchers who are used as "inning-eaters" are players who ordinarily are playing other positions.

And, please remember that any players leaving the RHWS today (Monday) to return on Thursday MUST turn in their player ID Card and re-register upon their return. They must return before the quarterfinals of the playoffs, regardless of division.

Please check the posted results and standings each day. Managers should contact Rob at the Tournament Headquarters (330.352.2175) with corrections to scores.

That's the best way to make sure that playoff seedings and pairings are as accurate as we can make them.

First Aid

Two key First Aid items: Drink plenty of fluids while playing; don't just wait until the game is over. Water will be available at the fields.

Second, be sure to stretch and loosen up before playing, or even re-entering a game.

In case of an emergency, contact the field manager at your site. He has the First Aid supplies and will contact 911 services as needed.

Ice is available for injuries ... check with the field manager on duty or go to the nearest concession stand to have the appropriate personnel paged. Roy Hobbs requests that managers plan for pitchers needing ice for their arms and to supply it.

Score Reporting

There is a QR code posted in every dugout that we will be using. Scan the code with your phone after every game and complete the score submission form.

Customer Service

Roy Hobbs Baseball is proud of its record on customer service.

Staff members are required to wear identifying staff shirts during the working hours of the tournament and should be easily identifiable. At least two are assigned to each of the satellite complexes daily.

In the case of **emergency**, please go to the nearest concession stand at the satellite complexes, where someone will be available to summon help.

Roy Hobbs field managers and key personnel are Red Cross First Aid **certified**, and Roy Hobbs Baseball has guidelines in place on the handling of injuries. Additionally, **AED devices** are available at each of the facilities, and Roy Hobbs personnel have been trained on those devices.

Playing site security

The active steps taken several years ago to deal with parking lot security will continue as parking lot theft issues have – knock on wood – not been an issue the last 7 years.

Are we out of the woods? No, it is a daily procedure and effort to make sure parking lots are safe.

Once again, Roy Hobbs will have personnel posted at the player/spectators' entrances to Terry Park, PDC, JetBlue Complex and at the entrance to the Quad fields at Lee County. These individuals will have a view of the parking lot, and they will be available in emergencies, be enforcing cooler guidelines and handling admissions.

Admission, \$1 a game

Admission continues at the Roy Hobbs World Series.

Admission is \$1 per game or \$6 for a tournament pass. The player ID card grants players access to all games in which they are not playing. Spectators will pay \$1 for entrance into each complex and are good for one day.

The \$6 tournament pass is available at RH Headquarters or from the Site Concierges at each security table; there is no family pass. The tournament pass is a plastic card that guarantees admission for that person for the duration of the RHWS. A loop comes with the tournament pass card for easy attachment to purses, beltloops, etc.

RH Label Cigars

RH Label cigars are available at PDC headquarters from the Roy Hobbs Geezer.

Cost: \$6 each or 5 for \$25.





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
